## **Your Latex Allergy Check List**

	Wear Medical Identification Medic Alert indicating '(Severely) allergic to natural rubber latex'
	Carry with you at all times:
	Medications, as prescribed by your allergist in case of an allergic reaction. This may include Epinephrine Auto-Injector (carry 2 doses), antihistamines and salbutamol inhaler.
	Non-latex gloves
	Letter from your allergist regarding your latex allergy status
	Notify the following Care Providers of your latex allergy. <b>ESPECIALLY</b> if you are undergoing an <b>Operation, Internal examination, X-ray procedure or Catheterization</b> of any kind
	Paramedics/ Hospital/ Family Doctor / Nurse Practitioner/ Physician Assistant Nurses / Midwife / Dentist / Dental Hygienist / Dental Assistant / Pharmacist / Radiologist / Specialist/ OBGYN, Chiropodiatrist Physiotherapist, Occupational Therapist Remind front end reception of your Latex Allergy
	Remember to also notify and remind your Hairdresser/ Beautician / Employer/ Coworkers / /Garage (servicing) / School / Friends / Relatives/ Daycares
	Carry a list of your medications prescribed by your Primary Care Team, Specialist(s) or Allergist and include self-selected medications (eg. over-the-counter medications, natural and herbal medicines, vitamins and minerals)
	Any additional information from your Primary Care Team or Allergist
	Avoid:
	Natural rubber latex gloves, balloons, condoms and other natural rubber products
	"Hidden" latex on food prepared with latex gloves
	Lactiferous plants that may have cross reactive proteins
	Foods with cross reactive proteins to natural rubber (banana, avocado, kiwi, chestnut)
